NONDrofit 360: A ROADMAP TO SUSTAINABILITY

In 2024, United Way of the Black Hills, in partnership with the John T. Vucurevich Foundation and Innovative NonProfit, launched Nonprofit 360: A Roadmap to Sustainability. Under the instruction of Innovative NonProfit, this grant-funded initiative aims to strengthen nonprofits across Butte, Custer, Fall River, Lawrence, Meade and Pennington counties. Nonprofit 360 supported over 172 agencies in 2024, fostering sustainable growth and empowering nonprofits to meet community needs effectively. This program offers four free paths to build capacity and leadership:

Leadership Training: Online and in-person Development Dimensions International® (DDI) courses to develop effective nonprofit leaders.

Nonprofit Connections: Quarterly workshops for skills training, networking, and practical application. Bridges to Boards™: Connects nonprofits with emerging leaders for board service through comprehensive training.

Nonprofit Co-op: Tailored coaching and consulting for United Way-funded agencies.



Black Hills Reads: Helps to ensure children are proficient readers by the end of the third grade.

Black Hills Reads (BHR) brings together partners across many sectors to strengthen the systems that serve early learners and promote literacy opportunities for children under the age of nine in the Black Hills. In 2024, more than 10,500 books were distributed to children through BHR programs and collaborations.

We're on a mission to build resilient kids and strong communities. United Way has collaborated with a group of experts on anxiety, depression, and psychological well-being to develop these activities for you. In 2024, the EveryDay Strong program impacted the lives of 195 individuals.

Imagination Library: SINCE 1995, DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY HAS BECOME THE PREMIER EARLY CHILDHOOD BOOK-GIFTING PROGRAM.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a program funded by United Way of the Black Hills to allow children ages 0-5 to receive an age-appropriate book mailed to their home once a month. In 2024, approximately 4,860 children were enrolled and received a book every month.

This year, we continued to drive impact through our key programs, including:

- Black Hills Reads: A community-wide movement to improve early literacy outcomes for young learners.
- Early Learner Rapid City: A collaborative effort to increase access to high-quality early learning, building a stronger foundation for children from birth to age five.
- EveryDay Strong Mental Health Workshops: Expanded to support mental well-being across our communities.
- **Nonprofit 360:** A Roadmap to Sustainability: A new initiative to develop nonprofit leadership and ensure long-term impact.

As we celebrated 80 years of service and more than \$71 million raised since our founding, 2024 became a year of impact and imagination. Our partnership with Innovative NonProfit supported over 170 agencies with tools to grow stronger and more sustainable. Impact Story:

Custer County Library 1,000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN

The 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program continues to make a powerful impact by nurturing a love of reading in young children and supporting families on their literacy journey. Recent improvements — such as expanding the selection of incentive books — have given children more choices when celebrating milestones, keeping them engaged and motivated.

Colleen P., a local parent, shared how the program has sparked a deeper love for reading in her son, Reuben:

"We are so glad that we enrolled Reuben in the 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program. He was already interested in reading, but this was just what we needed to ignite his love of it. He's excited for nap time and bedtime now, knowing we always read beforehand. I've watched new concepts click for him, and I'm confident his interest will carry into his school years and beyond. This program is such an ingenious way to improve literacy in our kiddos!"

Stories like Colleen's highlight how the program provides structure, motivation, and a sense of achievement — simply by encouraging families to track books and celebrate progress.

One especially heartwarming moment came from a young reader named Aaron. Each time he reached a milestone, he couldn't wait to choose his prize book — not just for himself, but to share with his cousin during visits. For Aaron, reading became a way to connect and show love.

Aaron's story reflects the true heart of 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten — it's not just about hitting reading goals. It's about joyful moments, meaningful connections, and the lifelong gift of literacy.






